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1. Introduction

The Wanesy[™] WAVE is a product based on Kerlink Low Power IoT Reference Design solution. It consists of a Wi-Fi and BLE device with a LoRaWAN[™] backhaul. The device notably provides the following functionalities:

- Communicate in LoRaWAN[™]
- Different Wi-Fi services
- BLE services

Main purpose of the device is for tracking, using Wi-Fi probe requests collection from Smartphones when doing people counting or Bluetooth Low Energy scanning and zoning when doing asset tracking.

It can then answer several questions such as:

- "How many people and/or assets are in that specific area?"
- "How many people and/or assets have been in that place for more than 10 minutes?"
- "Which are the new assets seen within the last 10 minutes?"
- "What is the list of assets in that area?"
- "Where is this specific asset?"

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3. Hardware architecture

3.1 Block diagram

The hardware architecture is described in the following diagram. It is based on Kerlink Low Power IoT Reference Design hardware architecture (in blue) with additions specifically designed for the wave product (in yellow).




Figure 2: Hardware block diagram

3.2 Functionalities overview

Wanesy[™] WAVE integrates several features:

- STM32L4 MCU:
 - ARM Cortex M4 80MHz core, under MyNewt OS
 - Non-volatile memory: 512kB internal Flash + 4MB external SPI Flash
 - Volatile memory: 160kB SRAM
 - Full specification documentation available here: <u>STM32L451CEU6</u>
- LoRa[™] radio: SX126x:
 - LoRa[™] & FSK modem
 - Frequency range from 863MHz to 928MHz
 - Conducted Transmit power: up to 15dBm (SX1261) or 22dBm (SX1262)
 - RX sensitivity (LoRa[™] modulation): down to -137dBm

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- ESP32 MCU:
 - Xtensa[®] dual-core 32-bit LX6 microprocessor(s), up to 600 MIPS
 - Non-volatile memory: 448kB internal ROM + 4MB external SPI Flash
 - Volatile memory: 520kB SRAM + 8MB external SPI PSRAM
 - BLE Radio:
 - Bluetooth 4.2 BR/EDR BLE dual mode controller
 - Class 1, 2 & 3 transmitter
 - Output power: up to +12dBm
 - Sensitivity: down to -97dBm
 - Wi-Fi Radio:

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3.3 LoRa® radio specifications

3.3.1 LoRaWAN

The LoRaWAN connectivity is provided by the:

- <u>SX1261</u> for the EU868 version
- <u>SX1262</u> for the US915 version

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


Figure 3: LoRa® antenna theorical radiation patterns

3.4 Wi-Fi and BLE specifications

3.4.1 Microcontroller

The Wi-Fi and BLE feature of Wanesy[™] Wave is supported by an ESP32 microcontroller from Espressif: <u>ESP32-D0WDQ6</u>

3.4.2 2.4GHz antenna

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


Figure 4: 2.4GHz antenna theorical radiation patterns

3.5 Power Supply

3.5.1 5VDC USB power supply

The Wave product is power supplied by an USB +5V (\pm 5%) 1A power source. The connector is a μ USB connector. The micro-B USB connector is located at the bottom side of the product as shown below:



Figure 5: View of micro-B USB connector

The main "DC" characteristics if the USB interface are detailed below:

A USB presence signal is connected to the STM32 microcontroller in order to detect plug/unplug of the USB cable.

Note: The USB connector is only used to power supply the product.

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3.5.2 Backup power supply

Wanesy[™] WAVE is equipped with a rechargeable backup power battery to allow continuous operation a few minutes after the loss of the power supply or when USB power supply is disconnected.

The backup battery is designed to allow the emission of a few LoRaWAN frames (for example). The backup battery solution is rechargeable.

- Seamless switch between backup and USB supply.
- Entering low-power mode when USB disconnection is detected.
- Automatically recharging the backup battery as soon as USB is plugged back.

3.6 User interface

3.6.1 LEDs

Wanesy[™] WAVE has two LEDs located on the front side of the product as described below:



Figure 6: View of LEDs

They are driven by the STM32 microcontroller. The LEDs are used to indicate the following behavior:

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3.6.2 USB connector

The USB connector is used as a power supply interface of the Wave product. It has no other purpose.

3.6.3 Debug interface

The debug interface of the Wave product allows to access signals of the STM32 and ESP32.

STM32 :

- SWD
- UART1
- Boot
- Reset

ESP32 :

- Boot_mode
- Reset
- UARTO
- UART2

The debug interface is only available using a debug probe (Kerlink specific) and has been designed for production and development purposes. Removing the casing is necessary to access the debug interface. Please note that opening the casing voids the warranty if any applies.

3.7 Memory


Two SPI flash memory of 4MB are connected to the STM32 and ESP32 (one for each): for example: <u>W25Q32JVSSIQ</u>.

4.2 Casing characteristics

The Wave product casing is a Takashi WP8-10-2G (plastic enclosure). The main characteristics of the enclosure are detailed hereafter:

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4.3 Mounting

Two \emptyset 3.3mm holes are usable to fix the product. These holes are hidden behind the blind lids and will not be visible




Figure 8: Mounting holes





Figure 10: Labels

5.1 Block diagram

5.2 Core Layer

5.2.1 Operating system

5.2.1.1 STM32

The OS used on Wanesy[™] Wave STM32 is the Apache MyNewt Operating System. MyNewt is a modular real-time operating system designed for the IoT developed by Apache Software Foundation.

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This OS is a free and open-source software distributed under the Apache License 2.0. The current version used is 1.3.0 (up to date). Regular update will be done on the Wanesy Wave to match with the newest MyNewt release.

This OS allows the use of:

- Preemptive scheduler (multithreading)
- Mutexes
- Semaphores
- Programmable soft timer
- Threads
- Message Queues.

5.2.1.2 ESP32

The Operating system used on the ESP32 is Arduino.

5.2.2 Network stacks

5.2.2.1 LoRaWAN

Wanesy^M Wave is compatible with the LoRaWAN^M Specification V1.0.2 and the regional parameters EU868 and US915MHz. All classes (A /B / C) are supported.

The implementation is based on the LoRaMac-Node stack from Semtech/Stackforce, driven by the Kerlink's lorawan_api package.

5.3 Services

5.3.1 Scheduler

The scheduler mechanism of Wanesy[™] Wave includes:

- Alarm mode to wake up the OS after a defined delay.
- Calendar mode to wake up the OS at a defined date time.

5.3.2 Power management

The power management mechanism included in Wanesy[™] Wave provide services to reduce the consumption of the overall product in order to optimize the customer's product lifetime.

5.3.3 Secure bootloader

Wanesy Wave provides the MCUBoot [3] secure bootloader

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5.4 Application

5.4.1 Wi-Fi Probe Request Count

The ESP32 manages the collect of the Wi-Fi probe request in list and manage counters. A result message is sent to STM32 for LoRaWAN protocol communication

5.4.2 BLE Scan

The ESP32 manages SCAN BLE of iBeacon and send result message to STM32.

5.4.3 Wave Application

5.4.3.1 Behavior of the product when connected to the power supply

When the product is powered supplied, the product can use all the features available on the product:

- Wi-Fi Probe Request Count
- Wi-Fi Access Point
- BLE scan iBeacon
- LoRaWAN transmissions for BLE scan result and WIFI Count

The ESP32 application must be able to enable/disable each feature depending on the configuration saved in the ESP32. If a feature is enabled, the application must also initialize the feature also based on the configuration.

5.4.3.2 Behavior of the product when disconnected from the power supply

When the product is disconnected from the power supply, for power optimization, it must enter a low consumption state which forces to stop (power off) all available features.

In this low consumption, the ESP32 is powered off and the STM32 must remain in deep sleep and wakes up periodically to send LoRaWAN frames to the network. The period of emission of the LoRaWAN is hardcoded in the firmware.

5.4.4 Led Behavior

The Two LEDs (Green & Red) are providing information on the functioning of the device. To optimize the backup battery usage, the LEDs are only used when the product is power supplied.

5.4.4.1 Green LED

- **Blinking** (ON = 200ms | OFF = 1s): During the initialization process:
 - Join accept received
 - ESP32 successfully initialized
- **ON:** After initialization
- **OFF:** When the product is not power supplied

5.4.4.2 Red LED

- **ON:** LoRaWAN operation in progress (TX/RX).
- **OFF:** No LoRaWAN operation in progress.

5.5 LoRaWAN

The LoRaWAN configuration is hardcoded in the firmware. Some LoRaWAN parameters can be modified using LoRaWAN Mac messages. More information is available in the LoRaWAN specification. LoRaWAN ADR mode is activated and no default DR is 2 in EU868 band.

5.5.1 Message uplink frame format for WIFI COUNT

Uplink LoRaWAN message concerning WIFI COUNT is sent in FPort: 80 Detail of uplink WIFI COUNT LoRaWAN message is in the COUNT Protocol Annex.

5.5.2 Message uplink frame format for BLE SCAN

Uplink LoRaWAN message concerning BLE_SCAN is sent in FPort: 85 Detail of uplink BLE SCAN LoRaWAN message is in the CBOR Protocol Annex.

5.5.3 Behavior in case of LoRaWAN emission not acknowledged

If a LoRaWAN frame is not acknowledged without retry mechanism. The number of retries is hardcoded in the firmware (equal to 3).

5.6 Exchange protocol between ESP32 and STM32

5.6.1 AT Protocol

The communication protocol between the ESP32 and STM32 is maintained by a bi-directional protocol on the UART physical layer. The protocol is inspired by AT Commands from 3GPP specifications.

A definition of the documentation is available in the AT protocol Annex. Exchange AT command process is described in LoRaWAN exchanges Annex.

5.6.2 CBOR Protocol for BLE SCAN result

The data BLE SCAN sent by the ESP32 to the STM32 is encoded using the CBOR protocol. CBOR frames are sent to LoRaWAN protocol in a second step.

Documentation to process specifically BLE scan result is available in the CBOR Protocol Annex. Annex part is used by customer to decode data received by LoRaWAN

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5.6.3 COUNT Protocol

The data for WIFI COUNT sent by the ESP32 to the STM32 is encoded using the WIFI COUNT protocol. An extraction of the documentation specifically for BLE scan is available in the COUNT Protocol Annex.

5.7 Over the air update

5.7.1 LoRaWAN

The reception of files (firmware or other) over the air on the Wave product must be done using the FUOTA (Firmware Update Over The Air) as described by the LoRa Alliance

That feature is currently under development. More information will be detailed here once released.

5.7.2 Wi-Fi

That feature is currently under development. More information will be detailed here once released.

5.8 Remote configuration

All parameters re-configured describe in this chapter are automatically saving and restoring after product restarted.

5.8.1 ESP32 application reconfiguration

Remote configuration is done using the LoRaWAN downlink messages. The strategy used for the Wave product is the transmission of AT command using the format defined in the AT protocol.

The STM32 will automatically forward the commands to the ESP32. Answers to the commands must be forwarded to the server using LoRaWAN uplink messages.

The LoRaWAN fport used for the uplink/downlink messages for AT command is: 65

1- Wi-Fi device RSSI threshold: AT command used to limit WIFI COUNT device with RSSI value higher than define threshold (Reference to chapter 1.3.3.2)

Payload text: (AT command)

AT+WPR/TH=-XX with -XX is RSSI threshold

⇒ Only Wi-Fi counter with RSSI higher than -XX

If XX is equal to 0, the threshold is removing and no RSSI filter appli More detail in AT+WPR/TH command annex

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2- **BLE SCAN major list:** AT command to program a major list of BLE ibeacon will be scan. If iBeacon of major different of list, it won't be selected.

Payload text: (AT command)

AT+BLE/MLIST=XX,YYY,... with XX and YYY is major value in Decimal (value from 0 to 65534)

When AT command is received by ESP32, only BLE iBeacon of major equal to one of listing major will be detected during scan.

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8. CBOR Protocol

CBOR protocol is based on chapter WiFi/BLE chip responses +CBOR on link <u>+CBOR response</u> for exchange from ESP32 to STM32

8.1 Presentation

When BLE scan sends data through the response "+CBOR=xxxxxx", the payload is transmitted in hexascii mode with a CBOR representation.

CBOR is a binary data serialization, close to a JSON representation. The transmission of data object contains key-values pair: by definition, the sender and the receiver must agree on the interpretation of these key-values pairs, but it will not break the compatibility if other pairs are added later.

8.2 BLE Scan use-case

One of the features of the BLE SCAN is to collect near BLE iBeacon. iBeacons collected during scan will be forwarded to a server in order to analyze them.

New iBeacon identification in this version to add major parameter and optimize the send

To be usable by the server, a caught BLE iBeacon must contain:

- MAJOR+MINOR iBeacon param (4 bytes data 2 MSB Major and 2 LSB minor)
- RSSI level

8.2.1 Format

Here is the description of the format used:

- a key "t" is used to indicate the absolute timestamp (GPS epoch) of the end of BLE Scan.
- a key "n" is used to store an array of new BLE identify from previous scan. Each data is composed of: MAJOR+MINOR iBeacon param + RSSI.
- a key "c" is used to store an array of confirmation of BLE identify after a delay of presence. Each data is composed of: MAJOR+MINOR iBeacon param + RSSI.
- a key "r" is used to store an array of not detected BLE identify from previous scan. Each data is composed of: MAJOR+MINOR iBeacon param.

In order to be more efficient, each data field is optimized, and described in following sections.

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8.2.1.1 DATA on format

The first entry in the table is a MAJOR+MINOR (between 1 to 5 bytes in CBOR mode). Optimization with the previous value of MAJOR MINOR parameter is done.

"type" parameter (1 bytes) is removed in this version and just one structure of data BLE tag identification for each format.

For 'n' and 'c' format:

- Array of 3 parameters: MAJOR+MINOR iBeacon param, RSSI and Moving/Status.

For 'r' format:

- MAJOR+MINOR iBEACON param (no array)

8.2.1.2 MAJOR+MINOR iBeacon parameter

Entry in the table is a 4 bytes with MAJOR in MSB (2 Bytes) + MINOR in LSB (2 bytes).

Each couple MAJOR+MINOR param is filter by ascending value.

An optimization is done for the second and the following iBeacon MAJOR+MINOR for one specific format ('c', 'r'and 'r') with only the delta.

BLE tag mustn't have major and minor equal to 0xFFFF(65535), unavailable tag BLE values.

Example:

- 0x08020245 => Major is 0x802 (2050 in decimal) and Minor is 0x245 (591 in decimal)
- If a second element in the same format is 0x08030102 (Major 0x803 and minor 0x102) the value of MAJOR+MINOR parameter will be 0xFEBD (equal to 0x08030102 -0x08020245)

8.2.1.3 RSSI optimization

All RSSI measurements have a negative value included in the range [0;-94]. In order to be more efficient on the CBOR encoding, we apply the following algorithm on the RSSI value:

(RSSI + 47) / 2 = enc_RSSI

10. LoRaWAN exchanges

Several LoRaWAN FPort are used on the application layer. Here is the description of the usage of these FPorts.

10.1 AT commands bridge

FPort: 65

Payload: the full AT command which will be transfer untouched to the ESP32 Description: To send an AT command to the ESP32, the buffer can be sent on the FPort 65 and the STM32 will transfer the buffer to the ESP32. The response of the ESP32 (data + OK/ERROR) is encapsulated into the next LoRaWAN Uplink on the same FPort (65). If an error occurs, the FPort used will be the 66.
